A lot is happening around Alhambra and City Hall, where things never slow down. This past month, the city council reviewed the **Housing Element**, which provides Alhambra with goals, objectives, and policies to direct and improve future housing development. The direction of housing is a topic most cities in Southern California struggle with, mainly because of the strong push in recent years by the State of California to increase density

within our cities. As with most issues of this nature, finding the right balance is key. Our Alhambra Housing Element must be certified with the State in order to be deemed complete and, therefore, must include many of the requests from the State.

As mentioned in a recent Mayor's Corner, Alhambra was the recipient of a rare grant in the amount of \$25 Million, which was made possible by the offices of State Senator Susan Rubio and Assembly Member Mike Fong. No other city has received a grant this large. The specific purpose of the grant is to build a new **Alhambra Community Center**, which will be located at the site of what many of us know as the Shorb Clinic, at the corner of Shorb Street and 6th Street.

The planning for this project is now well underway, with a couple of beautiful design concepts completed. I encourage you to provide your thoughts and feedback on this project, as it is something that members of our community will enjoy for many decades.

As we enjoy the many outings and dinners that are a part of the holiday season, I ask you to consider dining locally and supporting our local businesses. The local options are endless. An extensive list of options is available at alhambraeats. com.

# Newest Police Chief is Committed to Keeping Alhambra Safe

A day in the life of a police chief starts just like any other—Chief Kennedy wakes up in the morning and goes to work. Yet, much of his day is now composed of meetings, events, and administrative duties as opposed to the fieldwork he used to do.

When Around Alhambra asked whether he preferred the ability to make a difference from behind a desk or the wheel of a police car, he found it hard to say, as they are "completely different." Life for a sergeant and below is extremely hands-on because it involves daily interactions with the community. "You feel involved, like you're protecting someone," he said. Now that his work consists of setting policies, training officers to help people, and other newfound duties, he finds his work feels less hands-on. However, he happily adds, "Both ways you help people."

One improvement of note is that he is "now meeting people in happier times" as

opposed to on patrol — people tend to call the police on the worst day of their lives. However, he regularly goes on ride-alongs with police officers on patrol so he doesn't "lose touch."

Chief Kennedy's philosophy revolves around community policing, an approach that places Alhambra's people — especially younger folks — at the heart of his law enforcement efforts. He understands that policing is not just about enforcing the law but also about building relationships and trust within the community. He tries to get police to be in local schools as much as possible, "Not as warriors but as guardians." Creating connections with youth and ensuring they understand that "protecting them no matter what is our job" is essential, according to the Chief. "No problem is too small, and we'll be there to help no matter what hour of the Chief Kennedy has initiated a range of community engagement programs to strengthen community-police relations further. These initiatives include joining local neighborhood watch meetings, youth outreach, and open house events. By actively involving the community in decision-making, he aims to bridge the gap between the police force and the residents they serve.

Chief Kennedy has emphasized transparency and accountability as cornerstones of his leadership. He believes that an open dialogue with the community fosters trust and cooperation. By sharing information and engaging with the residents of Alhambra, the Police Department aims to build strong, positive relationships and address community concerns effectively.



He didn't always see himself becoming Chief of Police, let alone a police officer.

Kennedy initially attended college as a biology major — he wanted to become a doctor to help others. That was always the goal: helping others. While in school, he worked as a park ranger for the city of Anaheim, helping with things like first aid and generally keeping the park safe for visitors. He enjoyed being outside and helping people so much that he decided to become a police officer instead. He switched his major to criminal justice, and the rest is history.

This journey led him to Alhambra, where he has spent almost 23 years in the police department. "I love this community. It's extremely supportive of the police department," Kennedy said of his "second home." He added, "Working in Alhambra is well worth the drive." He thinks of the members of the police department as his immediate family; the Alhambra community is his extended family. In fact, he believes everyone should treat each other like family.

In the short time since he took the helm, Chief Garrett Kennedy has already impacted law enforcement in Alhambra. With his vision of community-centric policing and commitment to transparency, Chief Kennedy is steering the Alhambra Police Department toward a safer, more united, and forward-thinking future. His leadership is poised to leave a lasting, positive mark on the city and its residents, ensuring that Alhambra remains a safe and welcoming place for all.


### > E-Waste Collection at The Alhambra

## > ELARC Expands Office Space at The Alhambra

The Ratkovich Company has signed Eastern Los Angeles Regional Center (ELARC) to a 10-year deal for 23,345 square feet, adding to the community nonprofit's existing lease at The Alhambra. ELARC will now occupy just under 147,000 square feet, becoming the second-largest tenant at the 40-acre campus. The Alhambra is now more than 90% occupied, significantly higher than the average office building in L.A.!

ELARC is a private, nonprofit organization that coordinates and provides community-based services to individuals with developmental disabilities. The space serves as the administrative office for coordinating program services. ELARC has occupied office space at The Alhambra since 1996, when it first took about 32,000 square feet, according to ELARC Executive Director Gloria Wong.





# El Niño Conditions are Strengthening — What Does That Mean for the San Gabriel Valley?

We've all heard the saying, "When it rains, it pours." That was certainly the case last winter when storms dropped about 40 inches of rain in the San Gabriel Valley, more than double the yearly average. California is nearly drought-free now — most state and local reservoirs are near capacity, local groundwater levels have risen, and imported water deliveries, used to replenish local groundwater supplies, are at 100% for the first time since 2006.


The heavy precipitation we received earlier this year came at the tail end of a La Niña condition usually associated with droughts. Sudden storms like Hurricane Hilary led to Southern California recording one of the wettest summers on record. Some weather scientists, citing recent record high global ocean and surface temperatures, are forecasting a strong El Niño condition this winter, which may lead to heavy rain in some coastal areas of southern California.

This may be good news for our local water supply conditions, but there is still much we should do to save water. Drought will recur, and in the long run, we use more water than Mother Nature provides, so let's take these actions related to our precious water resources as winter nears.

First, reset your irrigation controllers and systems to water less frequently and in smaller amounts as the weather is cooler and rainier, and sunshine is not as intense. When it rains, turn off your watering system for a few days.

Second, purchase a rain barrel that can capture stormwater for reuse around your home. If you are buying a rain barrel, the District will provide you a rebate of up to \$35 (check the website: sgvmwd.com/water-conservation/#rebates).


Third, now is the time to plant California Native Plants and other drought-resistant vegetation to give your plants and

their roots a head start before next year's warmer spring and summer months (check our website for plant recommendations customized for Alhambra: sgvm-wd.com/wp-content/uploads/2022/05/CalScape\_Alhambra\_web.pdf.

# President Kennedy Remembered 60 Years On

For anyone who did not live through the terrible day of John F. Kennedy's death 60 years ago, it is difficult to appreciate the shock and confusion that affected everyone, including those of us in Alhambra. The generation before mine had experienced so much death in World War II and Korea, as well as that of President Roosevelt, but we "baby boomers" had not yet encountered national tragedy.

I was a senior at Mark Keppel High School on Friday, November 22, 1963. My mother had allowed me to drive her 56 Chevy Bel Air to school so I could feel cool. Everything started as usual. Once a month, there would be an assembly on Fridays, and we were dismissed from class to attend some performance or lecture. On this day, however, Principal Bruce Lawson and Vice Principal James Kemp were alone on the stage. This was odd, as this was their first time participating in an assembly.

As the auditorium was filling up, Principal Lawson spoke softly but firmly into the microphone. "Please take your seats and be quiet," he said. Such was his authority that we complied immediately. When we sat down and grew silent, he said, "We have just received word that the President has been shot."

There was an audible gasp from the entire room — an intake of breath and exhale of disbelief. Girls started crying, and boys tried to be brave while barely comprehending the announcement's implications. Principal Lawson told us that the assembly was canceled and that we were to go back to class. We filed out of the auditorium as if in mourning because we were.

Instead of going back to class, I went to the parking lot. I sat in my mom's car, listening to the radio news about the assassination. Vice Principal Kemp came out to the parking lot and saw me. He came over and stood by the car as we listened to the news. After a few minutes of us taking the news in, he told me to return to class.

By the time school was out, the country and Alhambra began closing down. Businesses closed for the rest of the day. High school football games were canceled. Movie theaters were closed. There was nothing on TV but the awful news. There was nothing to do.

At Keppel, however, there was a student play scheduled that night. It was decided that the show—and life—must go on. It's a good thing, too—there was standing room only for that play, such was the desire for normality. Principal Lawson led a prayer for the President before the curtain went up, and we all made the best of it.

President Kennedy was killed 60 years ago this month. Yet, his memory lives on. If you remember that day, what were you doing when you heard the news?



# Tax Tips: Retirement Planning

It is never too early to begin planning for retirement. Individual retirement accounts provide tax incentives to make investments that can provide financial security after retirement. These accounts can be with a bank or other financial institution, life insurance company, mutual fund, or stockbroker. A traditional IRA is the most common type of individual retirement account.

### What to Consider Before Investing in a **Traditional IRA**

A traditional IRA is a tax-advantaged personal savings plan where contributions may be tax deductible. Generally, the money in a traditional IRA isn't taxed until it's withdrawn. There are annual limits to contributions depending on the person's age and the type of IRA.

When planning when to withdraw money from an IRA, taxpayers should know a few things. First, they may face a 10% penalty and a tax bill if they withdraw money before age 59 1/2 unless they qualify for an exception. Usually, one must start taking withdrawals from their IRA when they reach age 73. For tax years 2019 and earlier, that age was 70 1/2. Additionally, special distribution rules apply

to IRA beneficiaries.

### Differences Between a Roth and a **Traditional IRA**

A Roth IRA is another tax-advantaged personal savings plan with many of the same rules as a traditional IRA, but exceptions exist. For example, a taxpayer can't deduct contributions to a Roth IRA. Qualified distributions are tax-free, and Roth IRAs don't require withdrawals until the owner's death.

# After Auto Accidents: Mobile Help and Quick Tips

Although no two auto accidents are alike, there are preparations and post-accident steps that every driver should take.

# Before An Auto Accident

Download the State Farm (or your insurance provider's) mobile app and register your account. This grants an accessible digital copy of your insurance information. Additionally, stash a hard copy of your insurance card and registration in your vehicle.

Keep a camera handy to document any post-accident damage. If you don't have a phone that can be used for this purpose, consider spending a few dollars on a disposable amera to keep in your vehicle.

# After An Auto Accident

First, ask yourself: Is anyone hurt? If so, immediately contact emergency services.

Always call the police, no matter the severity of the accident. Ask for and keep a copy of the police report.

Get out of the way if you can. If the vehicles are drivable, move them to a spot out of the way of traffic. Turn on your hazard lights and set up emergency cones if available. Then, get out of the vehicle unless it is unsafe to do so. Once in a secure spot, use your mobile app to contact Roadside Assistance for towing help.

Record all the details. Use the mobile app to alert State Farm you've been in an accident. Open the app to share information, such as contact and insurance details, with anyone involved in the accident.

Ask other drivers to share their details, too. That information will be needed once fault and financial responsibility are established.

# What You Should Never Do

Don't try to assign blame.

Don't sign or agree to anything from anyone other than the police - especially the other driver's insurance company.

Don't leave the scene of the accident until all the necessary information has been exchanged with the proper parties and everyone's safety has been ensured.

# What Happens Next

The mobile app will alert State Farm that you've been in an accident and begin the claims process. Coverage levels and determination of fault will help outline who is financially responsible for repairs and other costs, including medical bills. You can use the app to track the status of your claim with the claims center.

### 2023 Varsity Basketball







# The Relationship Between Vitamin D and Gum Disease

Periodontal disease and its early stage, gum disease, are destructive oral health conditions that affect the gums and supporting bones around the teeth. Periodontal disease is caused by a bacterial infection and can lead to gum and bone recession — even tooth loss if left untreated. While the primary cause of periodontal disease is related to other factors, recent research has also highlighted the role of vitamin D in its development and progression.

Vitamin D is fat-soluble and essential for calcium metabolism and bone health. Vitamin D deficiency puts children at risk of rickets, conditions in which bone does not mature, which causes skeletal deformities and osteoporosis in adults. It is estimated that approximately 1 billion people worldwide have a vitamin D deficiency, including people living in sunny California.



Vitamin D is essential for oral health as well. It is responsible for calcium absorption, which is necessary for strong teeth and optimal bone health. Additionally, vitamin D has been found to possess anti-inflammatory properties.

Several studies have examined the relationship between periodontal disease and vitamin D levels. They found that low levels of vitamin D increase the severity of periodontal disease and create poor treatment responses compared to those with sufficient levels.

Other studies published in the Journal of Clinical Periodontology discovered that vitamin D supplementation reduced gum inflammation and improved periodontal health. By regulating the excessive im-

mune response, the tissue damage in the gums can be significantly reduced.

Additionally, vitamin D may enhance the body's ability to fight off bacterial infections, including the bacteria responsible for periodontal disease.

Maintaining adequate levels of vitamin D is important for overall health, including oral health. While sunlight exposure is a natural source of vitamin D, it can also be obtained through diet or supplements. Foods rich in vitamin D include fatty fish (such as salmon and mackerel), fortified dairy products, egg yolks, and mushrooms.

If you are concerned about your periodontal health or suspect you may have periodontal disease, it is essential to consult with a dental professional. They can evaluate your oral health, provide appropriate treatment if necessary, and offer guidance on maintaining optimal oral hygiene practices.

In conclusion, while maintaining good oral hygiene practices remains the primary way to prevent and manage periodontal disease, emerging research suggests that vitamin D may play a role in its development and progression. Adequate levels of vitamin D, whether obtained through sunlight exposure, diet, or supplements, help support optimal oral health.

Starting October 15, many Americans will be faced with selecting their 2024 Medicare health insurance benefits as part of Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period, also referred to as AEP. Here are four crucial questions to consider when making your Medicare selection.

## 1. Are my doctors covered by this plan?

Original Medicare (Part A/B) allows you to visit any doctor in the United States who accepts Medicare. If you choose a Medicare Advantage plan, you must select from a specific network of primary care doctors, specialists, and hospitals. However, if the doctor agrees to treat you and accepts Medicare, you can still see an out-of-network doctor for covered services, usually for a higher out-of-pocket cost.

## 2. Does the prescription drug coverage meet my needs?

Whether you choose a Medicare Part D or Medicare Advantage plan, it is essential to look at the list of prescription drugs covered and ensure it includes your current medications. You will also want to make sure your local pharmacies can fill your prescription and whether you can get prescriptions sent to you by mail. If you have other questions about your medications, make a note.

# 3. What are my out-of-pocket costs?

Out-of-pocket expenses are the costs you are responsible for paying after Medicare has paid its share. This can include your monthly premium, deductibles, coinsurance (the percentage of costs of a covered health care service you pay after meeting your deductible), and

# The Season of ThanksGIVING

One of the uniquely American holidays is Thanksgiving. Like Independence Day on the 4 of July, it centers around our country's founding. Our Thanksgiving tradition comes from the early days of America when the pilgrims gathered in the fall and invited the Indians who had helped them survive their first year to share a feast of Thanksgiving. Their Thanksgiving feast was a way to "give back" to those who had enabled them to survive and thrive in this new world.

But the themes of giving and giving thanks are more critical to our lives than a seasonal holiday. Over the last several years, scientists have begun to study the effects of gratitude and sharing on our lives. Robert A. Emmons, a professor of psychology at UC Davis, is widely regarded as the world's leading scientific expert in the study of gratitude and has noted that thankful, giving people have "stronger immune systems, fewer noticeable aches and pains, lower blood pressure, increased energy, a desire to exercise more, and experience more refreshing sleep." Giving and saying "thank you" helps us create an attitude that affects our whole life.

Dr. Emmons also noted that giving and gratitude can be cultivated. We can produce new skills and reap wonderful results with a little concentrated effort. For example, plan to give to your favorite charity regularly and look for a way to serve the charity and/or donate financially. Make it a practice to say "thank you" when someone does something for you, even when it is the most mundane task, such as opening a door or pouring a glass of water. 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

# Why Do Housing Prices Keep Increasing?

During the past year, the Federal Reserve has taken dramatic actions to increase interest rates in our economy. The Fed's goal has been to "cool" the economy and reduce inflation. To a degree, this appears to be occurring.


From the summer of 2022 to the summer of 2023, mortgage interest rates more than doubled. As mortgage interest rates increase, the housing price that buyers can afford with their current payment decreases. For the last half of 2022, this actually occurred. But as 2023 has unfolded, prices are again increasing even with the higher interest rates

According to the S&P CoreLogic Case-Shiller 20-City Composite Home Price Index, home values fell for seven consecutive months beginning in July 2022, the first decline in over a decade. However, by this summer in July, national home prices fully recovered to peak levels of 2022.

The factor overwhelming the increase in mortgage interest rates is the decrease in the inventory of homes for sale. And this shortage of homes for sale increases housing prices beyond the "cooling' effect of higher mortgage rates.

Various key factors have propelled this lowering of inventory. Sellers are reluctant to sell and repurchase a new home at the higher mortgage interest rates. California's underproduction of new homes during recent years further lowers inventories. California's high cost of living complicates the redirecting of family budgets to spend more on mortgages.

California lawmakers considered SB 827 in 2018, which would have legalized taller, denser buildings near transit stops. The bill failed to become law



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amid complaints from NIMBY ("Not In My BackYard") groups, environmental activists, and even union organizations.

California's largest metro areas average inventories this August were 32 percent below the previous August, according to the Multiple Listing Service (MLS). This is more a reflection of the seller's reluctance to sell versus diminishing buyer demand. New listings to hit the market in California so far in 2023 are 32 to 36 percent below the prior year. This reduction in listings translates into a reduced volume of sales.

However, inventories of homes for sale in California are expected to increase in 2024. The California Association of Realtors (CAR) has forecast a significant increase in home sales next year in 2024. CAR anticipates sales to grow next year by 23 percent to 327,100 units. Mortgage interest rates will start to fall in 2024.

As borrowing costs decrease in 2024, the inventory of homes for sale will increase. This more favorable environment will motivate buyers and sellers to reenter the housing market next year and support first-time buyers. So, the near future for real estate commerce in California is cautiously optimistic.

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
